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SECRETARY GENERAL MESSAGE

Graeme Harrison-Brown - SecGen@ficsport.org

Welcome to the second and most important year of my tenure as the Secretary General of FICS. With all the strategy development work last year and the changes to the organisation that have occurred to date, we now find ourselves in the rebuild stage of the organisation. This is both exciting and daunting as we must continue to stabilise the ship while at the same time gearing it for growth to ensure we have the revenue streams to achieve our goals and objectives.

I am confident that with the team we have in place and the remaining changes that will be made over the coming year that we will see the fruits of our labours with FICS realising positive growth as we move into 2020.



Berlin in a nut shell

This year the FICS General Assembly and Symposium was held prior to the WFC Congress in Berlin, Germany. Even though the event can be considered a success from the positive steps achieved at the General Assembly to the interesting and stimulating topics discussed in the Symposium and the relationships and networks developed, it wasn't a great success from a financial and collaborative perspective.

Berlin has now given FICS a chance to take pause and consider the options for Tokyo to make it a truly epic event. We will look to changing our format so that it is aligned with our strengths and to derive greater value for our members and sponsors. The options that we have available to us are the holding of a hands-on ICSC course during the event to assist people in gaining their certification, greater involvement for our sponsors whose products align to the key theme, extending the number of speaker and research presentations to fill a larger program, and integrating with the WFC so it is a comprehensive program with multiple streams that allow people greater choice. There is much thought and discussions to be had on this over the coming months.

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Strategic Review

This year we revisited the FICS strategic plan that was developed on the gold Coast in 2018. It was inspiring to watch the FICS Executive Council and Commission Chairs working together to reconfirm that the direction and focus of FICS was still relevant and to take ownership of the plan. It was a long day for most which culminated in some fine tuning and further definition of the key activities that are required to be achieved over the next 12 to 24 months to achieve our growth aspirations.

I am confident when I say that FICS is an inclusive organisation that has moved to a collaborative model where we are all focussed on a common goal. There is still much work to be done to achieve the ideal structure where all the infrastructure is in place to support our operational activities. We know this, and we understand the challenges still ahead of us, so I am confident that at the end of the 2019 rebuilding process we will move into 2020 as a commercially focussed, sustainable organisation providing the best volunteers to support athletes of all levels. We will set financial goals that will stretch the organisation and as we achieve them we will celebrate our successes. The magic numbers for those in the know are 0.5. 1. 5. 12.5 and 25.

SECRETARY GENERAL MESSAGE

General Assembly

The lead up to the Berlin General Assembly was a daunting affair after being exposed to different opinions and perspectives on the outcomes of previous General Assemblies. We had a number of key motions to be approved on the day and I was pleased to see that they were all passed unanimously. The acceptance of the statute changes now sets the organisation up with a structure that separates the strategic and operational activities of the organisations and creates an environment for faster decision making and a level of trust within the organisation not experienced before. I believe the unanimous acceptance of the changes was a result of the FICS Executive being fully transparent and engaging the membership early in the process.

We also achieved the acknowledgement of three new NCSC's further expanding our membership base and providing FICS with the vehicle to continue to grow Sports Chiropractic globally. I welcome the new NCSC's (Botswana, Spain and the special members Vietnam) and look forward to working with you over the coming years.

The Audited Financial statements were approved by the General Assembly and a brief explanation of the road map for the future was provided. This road map focuses on financial growth through our three levers; memberships, sponsorships and the E Learning System. The release of the ELS will not only provide a solid revenue stream, it will also differentiate FICS as a specialist chiropractic stream.

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FROM THE DESK OF THE SECRETARY GENERAL

My View of FICS

FICS is an important part of the chiropractic profession as it provides support to our athletes, whether elite or recreational, enhances the careers of our members, provides important research into human performance through non-drug related medical support, provides opportunities for Olympic athletes, and generally exposes the profession to a wider audience through the status of sport and its stars in contemporary life. We have access to athletes that can provide positive role models for the profession and we should learn to work with them to build greater brand awareness of the FICS brand.

As an organisation we are able to provide our members with greater opportunities to participate in sporting events and educational seminars. We will achieve this by providing more events than previously attended and we will advise our volunteers and sponsors much earlier of our needs. This will ensure that we can commit early and improve the success rate of attendance.

We will look at ways to engage with our students more and offer them opportunities to gain experience in the field where we can. Our students are the future of the profession and the next leaders of FICS. They are important to us and so we will nurture them.

We will look to create thought leadership groups with our educational institution members, so they can participate in our development programs, so they benefit their students. We will work in collaboration with them to ensure we remain focussed on developing the future sports chiropractic leaders.

My Thoughts on the Sec-General Role

As a former CEO and part owner of a number of companies I was comfortable with being the face of the organisation and growing the business. I learnt the hard way though, that there comes a time when you can no longer both grow the business and run the business. At this point you need to find the right person to take one of the roles off you.

When I first accepted the role of Secretary General for FICS I had to determine how I would fit within the organisation as based on the Google definition of the role there was a large disconnect between what the definition was and how people were actually performing the role.

Based on this I decided to start with the accepted definition of the role of being the chief administrative officer for the organisation responsible for:

- Being the public face of the organisation;
- providing strategic leadership for the organisation;
- co-ordinating and contributing to the function of FICS;
- maintain and develop effective working practices that support good internal administration:

- reporting on the overall implementation of the organisation's activities; and
- representing the organisation externally and developing strong relations with key stakeholders.

I then tweaked the model as it didn't consider the delineation between growing and running the business. This meant that my responsibility was also to support the President to free them up from the daily operations of the organisation so they could be the true figure head of FICS. This was important as it allowed the President to focus on growing the business and elevated the status of the position in the eyes of our key stakeholders.

For FICS this structure provides a sound working relationship between the Secretary General and the President where the Secretary General is referred to for technical and business expertise while the President is the final decision maker. This clarity of roles appears to be producing a good working relationship between the Secretary General, President, ExCo and Service Provider.

I intend to continue to monitor and adapt this role to best suit FICS and its growth aspirations.

By coming together and strengthening our networks across the world, the future for international sports chiropractic looks even brighter. My thanks go to the dedicated work of the volunteers and members that make up FICS.

After wrapping up the final day of the FICS AGM that was dedicated to strategic planning, the annual in-person NCSC President meeting took place. What an amazing group of sports chiropractic leaders we have connected to FICS.

Every NCSC is a powerful driving force for sports chiropractic in the regions of the world. This is where being a member of FICS begins for many of you as this is automatically guaranteed through your NCSC membership. We acknowledge the great impact our members have within their NCSCs i.e. local communities, patient population, sporting teams/events, volunteering. Membership Commission is determined to support all NCSCs in the establishment and growth of their councils,

as we see this as a pivotal link in building the profile of sports chiropractic and helping all athletes under our care.

Highlights included:

- NCSC South Africa: covered 10 world champion level sporting events in 2018/19
- NCSC Japan: groundwork and partnership building continuing for Tokyo 2020
- NCSC France: sports chiropractic team covered European Female Handball Championships, due to cover upcoming Female Football World Cup, building relationships with key federations and sports stakeholders in country
- NCSC Spain: the first presentation to the group as the newest Full Member
- NCSC Canada: major inroads to developing pathways for chiropractors to be on sporting teams/field side
- NCSC Hong Kong: readying sports specific seminars in country for members
- NCSC Australia: new highs in membership numbers, 23 events in 2018/19 with 10000+ athletes covered, webinars success.





Sports Chiropractic & Sport Health Science: Get Your Head in the Game

Students at Life University maximize human performance by working with student-athletes and through working toward degrees in exercise science, athletic training and more.

What gives an athlete an edge on the competition? What elevates performance on the field, the court or in the water? How does physical activity – from the most everyday movements like walking to the precision of Olympic athletes – shape and redefine our health? "I played basketball growing up, was an assistant coach at a high school and my family is big on sports. So staying active and maintaining that connection is important to me."

Undergraduate exercise science students receive the highest-quality education and technical instruction in the disciplines of anatomy, biology, biochemistry, physiology and kinesiology, applying this knowledge to a range of populations.

They also learn to work with the body as an innately intelligent organism, and to care for athletes and community members through the LIFE Sport Science Institute (LSSI); Life University's public clinic, the Center for Health and Optimum Performance (C-HOP); and in a variety of internship/externship or practicum settings, including cardiac rehabilitation and adult fitness programs offered by hospitals, corporations and community organizations. Students studying health coaching learn how to help clients set and meet health goals, working with the public for a better understanding of whole-body health.

Graduate students take their careers even further, pursuing master's degrees in either Sport Health Science or Athletic Training. These dynamic programs deepen specialized knowledge while diversifying career opportunities, setting Life University

graduates for success in industries like athletic training, sport injury management, corporate wellness administration, physical therapy, fitness training, coaching and more.

Additionally, many students pursuing Life University's flagship Doctor of Chiropractic degree have a vision of caring primarily for athletes in their post-graduation practices. For these students, a Chiropractic Sport Science track within the M.S. in Sport Health Science degree exists. 

As part of the build-up to the World Games 2021, the IWGA (International World Games Association) in collaboration with the Birmingham LOC have announced that they will be running a number of test events. The first event that will be held will be the USA Beach Handball International Cup (iCup), from 18 - 21 JULY 2019. We are the only medical services that have been approached to cover this event at present but, the plan is to try and create an integrated polyclinic facility. We will keep you posted on this development. This is a fantastic opportunity for FICS and a major break-through with regards to the organisation and preparation for events of this magnitude. This is largely due to the brilliant work that Dr Brian Nook has done in developing FICS' relationship with the IWGA over the years and more recently the relationship he has built with the Birmingham LOC.

One of the biggest hurdles for us at these games is going to be licensure. We are working feverishly with the Birmingham LOC and their legal team to try and get temporary licensure for the duration of the games for our members who get selected for the FICS WG 2021 Team. Unfortunately, until we are able to get this piece of legislation passed, these WG 2021 Test events will be reserved for our members from the USA. I do need to make it clear

though, that being selected for these WG 2021 Test events will not necessarily guarantee a position on the FICS WG 2021 Team.

Please go to our events page and encourage your NCSC members to submit an application for consideration! You are welcome to apply also of course. Sunshine Tour – South Africa

DR JASON FYFER. PRESIDENT CHIROSPORT SOUTH AFRICA.

I have had the privilege to be involved as the Chiropractor for the Sunshine Tour since 2007 until the end of last year. The Sunshine Tour typically runs during the Southern Hemisphere's summer and is a combination of local Tour events, the pinnacle event being the Nedbank Challenge with 4-5 co-sanctioned European Tour events; SA Open, Joburg Open, Tshwane Open and Alfred-Dunhill Championship, dependent on sponsorship. Over the past 3 years the Sunshine Tour has partnered with the Asian Tour and created "triple-sanctioned" events, the SA Open and Mauritius Open.

Over the past 11 years it has been phenomenal to see how the Unit has grown in its role within the Tour as well as the utilization rates amongst Tour professionals. I was fortunate to be asked to join the "Physio Unit" as it was called in those days by Dr Ricardo Jorge. The request to have Sports Chiropractic available in the unit was driven primarily by the European Tour professionals. This demonstrates how Sports Chiropractors involved with professional athletes in their private practices, at junior and grass roots levels has shaped these athletes and afforded them the opportunity to get performance care from early on in their careers. This in turn has ensured that these athletes now ask to have Chiropractors involved in events they participate in, so that they can have the choice of care they need in their various events.



I am happy to say that in my second year the Unit was renamed The Players Fitness find Therapy Unit on the Sunshine Tour. During the co-sanctioned events the Unit was staffed by three Physiotherapists and a Chiropractor, on the smaller local events this would then be cut down to two Therapists. Usually this would be a Physiotherapist and Chiropractor, depending on the availability of the various therapists.

During this time the Unit came into its own as a multidisciplinary unit with a fantastic cohesion and work ethic between the two professions whilst simultaneously interacting with the trainers, swing coaches, sports psyches and other professions utilized by the Tour professionals.

My time on the Tour gave me the priceless ability to test, seminar skills, adjusting techniques, taping techniques and assessment protocols on athletes that were incredibly motivated to be screened and tweaked in order to achieve consistent performance.

I can never falter the enthusiasm of the younger professionals on Tour who were always willing at the beginning of the season to get their posture photos, training protocols and testing various techniques on them to see what worked best for them, whilst giving me a fantastic education and experience on athletes at this level.

The team of therapists involved in the Unit has stayed much the same for at least 4 years at a time, This has allowed an environment to develop where all involved became more open minded to differing techniques and schools of thought. The openness and maturity demonstrated by all involved over the years has allowed us to be able to question each other's protocols without stepping on toes. This allowed the athletes to get the best from both professions and gave us the opportunity to achieving what a multidisciplinary team should strive to be and focus on the needs of the athlete without too much of our own personalities becoming involved.

I have had the good fortune of being involved in multidisciplinary teams before and after this and I have never been able to be a part of such an integrated and cohesive Unit which I will always cherish.

In the early days the Unit would assess professionals at the beginning of a season and we would program a training protocol to help the athlete with complaints that either they had at the time, or working in conjunction with their swing coach. As time has gone by, the majority of the top players now have their own trainers that travel with them on tour and the ability to

communicate effectively between the golfer, coach, trainer, (nutritionist, partner etc you get the idea) and manager, has become even more important to get the results the athlete is striving for.

In recent years the addition of other support staff to the professional's team has meant that the therapists have had to become more focused on providing functional outcomes for the Tour professionals and primarily focused on providing corrective solutions as opposed to symptomatic care. However, there is always one member of the team that is on duty to go on course and assist in an emergency,

if called upon, necessitating that you understand the rules in such occasions (and golf has a number of these rules). Unfortunately, as is often the case Chiropractic has been seen as an outsider in a Multidisciplinary team and over the years myself and the other Chiropractors who have worked in this unit have been able to demonstrate the value that Chiropractic can provide the athletes. This is evidenced by the utilization rates we see amongst the players coming in for treatment by the Chiropractors. An interesting statistic is that the foreign Tour professionals make far more use of Chiropractic services than the local Tour professionals. This highlights the need to work more with local golfing bodies in South Africa and develop strategies to showcase the benefits Sports Chiropractic provides. A final word for the younger Sports Chiropractors wanting to get involved or for those who are already involved in a multidisciplinary Unit.

Understand the value in teamwork, and this is not a cliché. There is nothing more satisfying than working simultaneously side by side with another therapist on an athlete and getting a breakthrough.

The athlete comes away from the interaction with far greater respect for both professions and you learn things that you never would have been able to consider in private practice.

Always work to help the team achieve, try your best to not be an individual within that team. You may think this goes unnoticed, perhaps even for years, but it will be noticed and this only puts you as the clinician and the profession in the best light, showcasing your professionalism and maturity and the value we know Sports Chiropractic brings to these athletes.

Learn to communicate, this not only applies to the athlete to help them achieve their outcomes. But without including their support team there will never be a full buy in on their part. An added bonus is the support team will value and trust you even further by the fact that you have included them in the care of the individual we are all trying to help achieve.

Again, the ultimate goal of the team is to put the athlete first and help them in whatever goals they have set out, whether it is to just get through the day or get them into the Top 50, for a place at the Masters.



This conference would not be possible without the help and dedication of our conference committee members, Dr. Jenn Turner and Dr. Matt Wentzell.



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World Pond Hockey Championships

Since 2007 I have had the pleasure of running the Chiropractic and Sports Injury clinic at the World Pond Hockey Championships (WPHC) in Plaster Rock, New Brunswick. The WPHC celebrated its 18th anniversary this year.

The WPHC has grown exponentially since it began in 2002. The idea grew from the combined genius of Tom Chamberlain and Danny Braun who had conceived of many differing ways to raise funds to build a desperately needed new indoor hockey arena for their tiny community of approximately 1200 peolpe. While traditional ideas of snowmobile races fell by the wayside, the ironical concept of an international outdoor pond hockey tournament to build an indoor arena began to take shape.

While other cities across Canada had prototyped the same idea, Plaster Rock chose a unique four-on-four format (as opposed to three-on-three) with no goalies. The nets were designed with the standard NHL width of six (6) feet, but the height was limited to 10 inches. Many felt the idea was folly, but Plaster Rock persevered and started the first tournament in 2002.

A series of media articles began to appear across Canada and internationally, but it was the seminal piece by Bryan Gruley of the Wall Street Journal after the 2004 event that created the international hype that made the WPHC the incredible world class event it has now become.

Add-in the now infamous NHL strike of 2004-5 and a hockey starved Canada, and the recipe for success of the WPHC was preordained. In 2005, TSN made Plaster

Rock their television headquarters during the WPHC championships and their TV ratings and general WPHC interest took-off.

Plaster Rock is especially blessed as it has the perfect venue – Roulstone Lake is large enough and the winter ice pack is deep enough to support a multitude of active rinks for many teams at one time. The lake has been configured to allow for 24 rinks that are 75% of regulation NHL size and allow 48 teams to play simultaneously. Qualification roundrobin play begins on Thursday evening and ends on Saturday afternoon, with every team being guaranteed five (5) games.

Over 800 teams a year vie for approximately 122 spots in the men's division and women's division. A lottery decides which teams are invited to play in the tournament. WPHC is truly an international event. Teams are from all Canadian provinces and Territories, the United States as well as Denmark, Singapore, Libya, Puerto Rico, England, Ireland, Bermuda and Cayman Islands, Czech Republic and Slovakia.

Teams qualify for the single-game elimination format held early Sunday morning and the champions are crowned by late Sunday afternoon.

The eventual WPHC champions hoists the Goodwill Cup which is a wood replica of the Stanley Cup..

WORLD POND HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP CONTINUES...


The tournament ran again this year like clockwork thanks primarily to the 400 local volunteers – and recognizing how incredible this is when the Village of Plaster Rock has a population of only 1,200 persons. Over 8,000 spectators were in attendance this year.

My clinic- which resembles a M.A.S.H. unitwas situated right beside the 24 rinks. Players could almost skate from the lake right into the clinic. My team was inundated with players seeking care, many returning year after year. The clinic is quipped the clinic with a portable treatment tables,

Interferential/ultrasound machine, paperwork (including Informed Consent), Thumpers, Kinesiotape etc. Many players had been or were chiropractic patients and requested maintenance care/adjustments. Others had incurred injuries while playing and required chiropractic care for the first time. Many players presented with typical sprain/strain athletic injuries.

The chiropractic team was able to help these patients manage their pain and provide a clinical opinion if it was prudent to continue to play in the tournament or seek further medical care.

Thank you to the New Brunswick Chiropractic Association for providing me the opportunity to work in New Brunswick.





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Asian Report

Vietnamese Sports Chiropractic Council

FICS welcomes the Vietnamese Sports Chiropractic Council headed by Dr Wade Brackenbury to the family. Dr Wade is no stranger to the region practicing in Malaysia for 5 years before staring the first legally registered Chiropractic clinic called American Chiropractic Clinics in Vietnam 10 years ago. ACC and Wade is active in the Sports Community having a strong presence in Ultramarathon, Rugby and IronMan events while treating Professional Basketball teams in the community. FICS welcomes the VSCC.

In March, Dr Camara, FICS Asian Representative was able to conduct a short seminar on Sports Chiropractic for the group and introduce the Chiropractors to FICS as an organisation about ensuring access of sports chiropractic care to every athlete. The message that Sports Chiropractic is good not just for the specialty but to the growth of the profession as a whole was well received. Dr Camara was also able to present Dr Wade with his FICS certificate of membership.

Philippines

Dr Martin Camara was appointed by the Philsilat organisation as Medical Director of their sport last Feb., 2019. Philsilat garnered 3 bronze medals in the last Asian Games in Palembang Jakarta which was one of the highest performing sport associations of the Philippine Olympic Commitee for those games. Additionally they won 2 Silver Medals and 2 bronze medals in December of the same year in the World Championships held in Singapore. 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

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
